**CASTLE KICKS OFF SUMMER WITH CULTURAL CELEBRATIONS**

Whether it's learning how to make a Native American medicine pouch, enjoying the sounds of one of Saginaw's most famous jazz musicians, or tasting Mexican sweet bread, the Castle Museum will be a fun place to take the family this summer to learn about different cultures.

On Tuesdays and Thursdays throughout the summer, the Museum will highlight a different culture with a wide range of activities and lectures. All of the events are free with paid admission to the museum, which is \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for children.

The first cultural celebration is set for Tuesday, June 22<sup>nd</sup> at Noon. Participants will learn how to make a Korean lotus lantern. On Thursday, June 24<sup>th</sup> we will continue our focus on Korean culture and learn how to make traditional Korean Knots or Maedeup. Guests also will get to sample Korean Pancakes, which are called pajeon.

All of the cultural celebrations begin at Noon. While there is no charge for the events, pre-registration is required to ensure there are enough supplies.
