

# The Artifact A Very Saginaw Interpretation of an Italian

Luxury Liner

Launched in Genoa, Italy on August 1, 1931, the story of the S.S. *Rex* is not a Saginaw story; however, the story of this model of the ship *is* a Saginaw story. The model – or should we call it a sculpture - was made by Frank Griffin. Griffin was known for his involvement in the Boy Scouts and his creation of detailed tin models of ships and aircraft – he and his models were featured in a *Fox News* reel.\*

Griffin was born in Niles, Michigan in 1863. He and his parents came to Saginaw in 1866. According to his obituary, he received his education at early East Saginaw Schools – the Academy, Emerson, and Germania. As a young man, he was a seaman on the Great Lakes and, for a time, worked in "Michigan's woods" – we interpret that to mean he worked in logging. He continued his training in sheet metal work through the International Correspondence Schools. A January 24, 1904, Saginaw Evening News advertisement for the school includes his testimonial:

'I owe my success to it.' Frank Griffin, Prop. Valley Tin and Sheet Metal Works.

Griffin was also a member of the Michigan National Guard and served during World War I. In addition to developing his business, Griffin devoted his time to forming a drum and bugle corps that practiced in his shop on Federal Avenue. His obituary notes:

[B]oys made his shop their headquarters and the roll of drums and blare of bugles echoed nightly from the building.

It was his leadership in Boy Scouting that earned him his nickname "Dad."

But it was with his model boats that Mr. Griffin gained his greatest renown. Since 1914, when he first turned to the use of sheet metal as a medium for the outlet of his skill, some 25 models were completed.

They represent hundreds of hours of painstaking exactness, research and study, for 'Dad' was thorough. His models were built to scale, correct to the most minute detail. (*The Saginaw News*, July 25, 1936.)

While we do not have a complete list of the models he made, newspaper articles indicate Griffin fabricated a model of the U.S.S. Constitution---he took it to schools and shared it with students. He made a model of the American Red Cross ship which he presented to Lottie Lee Greve, secretary of the local chapter. Although he would at times give his models to individuals or organizations, they were not for sale. Other known models included an American destroyer for the Navel Reserves parlor in the Armory and models of Columbus' ships that were featured as decorations at a 1936 meeting of the Professional Women's Association held at the Michigan Country Club.

At this point, we don't know the exact history of the Castle Museum's sculpture of the S.S. *Rex.* It is signed and dated 1935. According to the history we received with the donation, it was displayed for a time in an unidentified Bay City restaurant, which is where it acquired a display base that recounts both Frank Griffin's achievements and the story of the *Rex.* When he passed away, the *News* noted:

In 'Dad' Griffin's Sheet metal shop at 307 ½ Tuscola street, in the midst of metal scraps and tinsmith's tools, there rests a partially completed model of the steam yacht, Capitola.

It can never be completed now. 'Dad Griffin is dead.' (*The Saginaw News*, July 25, 1936.)

*I Am A Man: Photographs of the Civil Rights Movement,* 1960-1970 was inspired by Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and the thousands of courageous people who risked their lives to end segregation. Often taken during dangerous situations, these photos take the viewer back to a pivotal historical moment of change in the United States—and also reminds us how far we have yet to come.

Brought to the museum in part by the National Endowment for the Arts, Exhibits USA, and the Mid-America Arts Alliance, *I Am A Man* will run from April 6-May 25, 2025. Guests are invited to view these iconic images that demarcate this special body of work and reflect on how these photographs and their message still remains relevant today.




