Often historic photographs provide a unique, tangible link between the past and present. Such is the case with immediately to the south; originally it was part of a this image of a prominent Saginaw City pharmacist.

Eugene Ringler, druggist, Saginaw City, was born in Wurttemberg, Germany, May 5, 1824. He received his education in his native land and in 1847 came to America. He graduated from the medical department of the University of Michigan in 1852, after which he went to Ohio, and practiced medicine at Fostoria until 1857. He made a visit to Germany during a few months of that year, and on his return located at Tiffin, O., where he continued to practice until the breaking out of the war in 1861. He enlisted as Assistant Surgeon and was afterward promoted to Surgeon, serving until the close of the war in 1865. He returned to Tiffin, remained there two years, and then he came to Saginaw City. After being here one year, he went into partnership with E. Epting, which relation lasted one year, when he removed into his present store on Hamilton st. His business has increased yearly, and he is one of the substantial druggists of this city. In 1857, he married Mary Kapff, a native of Germany. They have 3 children, viz: Lydia, Eugene and Annie. Eugene was engaged in the drug business at New York but at present is in Paris, France." (M.A. Leeson and Damon Clarke, History of Saginaw County, Michigan, Chicago: C.C. Chapman & Co., 1881.)

Eugene Ringler's store prospered at its South Hamilton Street location until 1900. In 1902, he placed an advertisement in the paper:

"Drug-shelves and Counters, for sale hardwood elegant, cheap for cash by E. Ringer 118 S Hamilton." (The Saginaw Evening News, June 30, 1902.)

Although Ringler rented his former store to various businesses and organizations, he continued to reside above it. Dr. Ringler, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Julius Ippel, on November 4, 1916.

If you have walked down the 100 block of South Hamilton, you may recognize something naggingly familiar in this photograph of Dr. Ringler's store. Look carefully at the foliate decorations in the middle of the cast iron columns and pilasters – they match ones on the units framing the storefront of J.B. Meinberg and Woody O'Brien's at 116 S. Hamilton. Eugene Ringler's


pharmacy was located at 118 South Hamilton, and Tr row of stores erected about 1870. Designed to form a cohesive architectural unit, the design of each storefront was similar and incorporated identical cast iron components. In 1909, Ringler sold his property to John B. Meinberg, who owned the adjoining saloon.

Meinberg was one of the investors in a new venture a theater. Soon the building that had housed Ringler's pharmacy was demolished - along with another storefront—to make way for the Wolverine Theatre. A 1916 article, published at the time of Ringler's 92nd birthday, notes his store had been located on South Hamilton "where the Wolverine theater is now located."

Although the upper floor of the remaining portions of the row of stores was refaced in Saginaw Paving Brick, original storefront details survived, reminding us that even after more than a century of growth and change small details connect the past and the present.

Souvenir of Saginaw: **A Lifesize View of Yesteryear**

On February 1, 2024, the Museum will begin showcasing a small item from the collection by making a supersized version into a full exhibit in Centennial Hall. The small, souvenir booklet of Saginaw images, "Souvenir of Saginaw," was published by William F. Twelvetrees in 1889, just as East Saginaw and Saginaw City were about to merge.

The promotional piece, sold on traincars, shops and in Twelvetrees' store at 215 Genesee for a mere \$0.15 was an inexpensive momento of one's trip to the booming Saginaw area, and more importantly, a promotional piece for Saginaw itself. As Michigan's third largest city at the time, Saginaw's sweeping street scenes, thriving businesses, and lavish homes were laid out across the fanfolded leaves of the booklet, giving readers a glimpse into Saginaw's prominence and importance.

The Souvenir of Saginaw exhibit will offer a similar appeal to museum vistors, giving guests a chance to walk back in time as they peruse Twelvetrees' original scenes, towering eight feet high around them on vinyl enlargements, and view the city as it was in the late 1800s.
