# The Artifact

### The Many Stories of a Ceramic Eagle

Featured in the Castle Museum's exhibit exploring the life and achievements of Saginaw's first woman City Council Member, Audra Francis, this small statue of an eagle started life as a rather ordinary piece of commercially produced greenware - the type finished and decorated at ceramic studios. However, Audra Francis transformed it into something quite extraordinary, a piece uniquely bridging Saginaw events and lives.

Francis' skill at communicating and connecting with people made her a natural leader - and a great fundraiser. She was a leader in Saginaw's United Fund, known today as the United Way. The Saginaw News quoted her: "...my greatest hobby is making friends by being one." One of her tools - her trademark, even - was creating small tokens to commemorate shared events and commitments. These small tokens were personal, heartfelt creations. Often, she created a series of nearly identical items. However, her 1969 creation for William T. Kessell of the William C. Wiechmann Company is unique. This ceramic eagle possesses such a strong narrative quality that it became a miniature museum of that year's United Fund campaign theme and the story of Wiechman's store. It is one of the finest examples of Francis' work.

The 1969 United Fund campaign was the 50th anniversary of – as The Saginaw News put it - the "united way of giving in Saginaw County." The William C. Wiechmann Company's commitment was up thirty-five percent over 1968. Francis was the chair of the sponsors committee and at a campaign luncheon on October 20, she "gave a historical account of events taking place 50 years ago today." The tiny paintings on the statue's plinth connect the viewer with these stories – and more.

On the front is a 1969 exterior view of the retailer's South Jefferson Avenue store and on the reverse is the exterior view of the business in 1919. On one of the sides is a depiction of the firm's first floor sales space. The miniatures Francis painted are detailed and precise – so precise, in fact, that they capture details of a recently completed remodeling. A project

completed just as the 1969 United Fund campaign was underway. The firm advertised:

We proudly present to you a new Wiechmann's of extraordinary beauty and convenience, bringing to you a new and gracious kind of shopping experience. We have been working on this remodeling project for more than a year. We presented you with a completely new front including new display window ... Now you will see a rearranged, carpeted and enlarged main floor that will appeal to your imagination and delight your taste. All made uniquely pleasant and rewarding by the warm friendliness of Wiechmann people who will serve you with courtesy and skill. Come see us. *The Saginaw News*, October 26, 1969.

When the Saginaw Hall of Fame was founded in 1964, Audra Francis was – as she was so many times- the only woman member of the organization's board. She was elected to the Saginaw County Hall of Fame in 1991.

# Saginaw "United" Schools

With a planned opening date of August 5, the West Gallery of the museum will be transformed into an historic retrospective on Saginaw's schools with a new exhibit, *Saginaw "United" Schools*.

The exhibit will trace the history of Saginaw High and Arthur Hill Schools, beginning before they even carried those names. It will focus on the development of the schools and how they were shaped by, and reflect, a community that was two separate cities until they consolidated in 1890. Even after the consolidation, Saginaw had two separate school districts until 1926.

While the exhibit will focus on the buildings that housed the two schools and the new building being constructed for Saginaw United, the single high school that will serve Saginaw, it will also tell the stories of the entities that operated in them, their development, facilities and staff.

The story will be told using the unique collection of artifacts preserved by Saginaw Public Schools and now part of the museum's collection.

# Saginaw County Sports Hall of Fame *The Class of 2024*

The Saginaw County Sports Hall of Fame is excited to announce who the Lifetime Voting Members have elected into the Class of 2024! The ballot this year was built a bit differently; there were categories for different sports instead of the usual categories. As a result, this year, voters chose people from hockey, golf, tennis, and bowling in addition to the normal male/female athletes and team. This change generated excitement and allowed the focus to shift to some Olympic sports and not just the big revenue ones.

The Class of 2024 is a vibrant one and the voting was remarkably close in several categories.

In the female athlete category, the electors chose Nouvel/Texas/Notre Dame swimmer Heidi Hendrick. Hendrick was a multi-sport athlete at Nouvel from 1996-1999, with swimming being her dominant sport. In 1998 she was named Michigan Class B-C-D Swimmer of the Year. She went on to swim at Texas and Notre Dame, later transitioning to a pentathlete and competing on Team USA in 2022 and 2023.

The male athlete elected was basketball player Lou Dawkins from Saginaw High and Tulsa. From 1986-1989, Dawkins scored more than 1000 points for Saginaw

High's boys varsity basketball team. After playing collegially at Tulsa, Dawkins returned to Saginaw High to coach the boy's team for seven seasons, including state championships in 2007 and 2008. In 2007 he was honored as National Coach of the Year. He currently coaches at Muskogee High School in Oklahoma.

The team selected was Freeland High School state champion softball teams from both 2003 and 2005. In 2003, Freeland claimed the Division 3 state title with a 1-0 win over Niles Brandywine. Two years later, Freeland beat Riverview, 4-0, for the state title.

In the tennis category, Guy "Ike" Garber was picked for his achievements in the 1930's and early 1940's. Playing for both Cranbrook Prep School and later Arthur Hill, Garber won two MHSAA Class A singles state titles. He went on to play at the University of

Miami, Florida, and later won three Michigan State men's titles, along with men's junior and senior tournaments. Through his promotion of tennis he helped create the Garber tennis courts.

> World Champion professional bowler Tom Smallwood was selected from the bowling category. A SVSU graduate, Smallwood won his PBA card in 2003 and his exemption in 2009. During the 2009 season, he won the PBA World Championship, which he won again in 2013 with the longest sudden death overtime in PBA history.

For the hockey category, the 1980-81 Saginaw Gears Turner Cup Champions were selected.

Coach John Musulin was picked to represent the swim category this year for all his work at MacArthur and Heritage. Musulin has been honored as Saginaw Valley Coach of the Year, Regional Coach of the Year, as an inductee into the Monroe High School Hall of Fame, the Michigan Swim Coaches Hall of Fame and the Saginaw County Swimming Hall of Fame.

Finally, electors chose to honor St. Charles' Nick Pumford in the golf category. Pumford earned all state honors from 2003-2005, finishing second in Michigan in 2004 and 2005. He went on to golf at the University of Michigan, earning the Big Ten Sportsmanship Award. Pumford went on to play professionally before beginning a successful coaching career. He currently coaches at Oakland University.

In Saginaw County there is an "embarrassment of riches" when it comes to success on the field or court—this was one fun way to honor and remember what our residents have done in the field of competition. While some have risen to the highest levels, all are worthy of their election into the Saginaw County Sports Hall of Fame.
